You must show sufficient working to make your methods clear to the Examiner. Answers without working may gain no credit.

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1. Evaluate  $\int_1^4 \frac{1}{\sqrt{(x^2 - 2x + 17)}} dx$ , giving your answer as an exact logarithm. (5)
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2. The hyperbola  $H$  has equation  $\frac{x^2}{16} - \frac{y^2}{4} = 1$ .

Find

- (a) the value of the eccentricity of  $H$ , (2)

- (b) the distance between the foci of  $H$ . (2)

The ellipse  $E$  has equation  $\frac{x^2}{16} + \frac{y^2}{4} = 1$ .

- (c) Sketch  $H$  and  $E$  on the same diagram, showing the coordinates of the points where each curve crosses the axes. (3)
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3. A curve is defined by

$$x = t + \sin t, \quad y = 1 - \cos t,$$

where  $t$  is a parameter.

- Find the length of the curve from  $t = 0$  to  $t = \frac{\pi}{2}$ , giving your answer in surd form. (7)
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4. (a) Using the definition of  $\cosh x$  in terms of exponentials, prove that

$$4 \cosh^3 x - 3 \cosh x = \cosh 3x. \quad (3)$$

- (b) Hence, or otherwise, solve the equation

$$\cosh 3x = 5 \cosh x,$$

- giving your answer as natural logarithms. (4)
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5. The curve  $C$  has equation

$$y = \ln (\sec x), \quad \frac{\pi}{3} \leq x < \frac{\pi}{2}.$$

Taking  $s = 0$  at the point where  $x = \frac{\pi}{3}$ , find an equation for  $C$  in the form  $s = f(\psi)$ , where  $s$  and  $\psi$  are intrinsic coordinates.

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6. The curve  $C$  has equation  $y = \cosh^3 x$ .

(a) Show that the radius of curvature of  $C$  may be written as

$$\rho = \frac{(9c^6 - 9c^4 + 1)^{\frac{3}{2}}}{3c(3c^2 - 2)},$$

where  $c = \cosh x$ .

(b) Find, to 2 significant figures, the radius of curvature of  $C$  at the point where  $x = \ln 2$ .

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7. Given that

$$I_n = \int_0^4 x^n \sqrt{4-x} \, dx, \quad n \geq 0,$$

(a) show that  $I_n = \frac{8n}{2n+3} I_{n-1}$ ,  $n \geq 1$ .

Given that  $\int_0^4 \sqrt{4-x} \, dx = \frac{16}{3}$ ,

(b) use the result in part (a) to find the exact value of  $\int_0^4 x^2 \sqrt{4-x} \, dx$ .

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8. (a) Show that  $\operatorname{artanh} \left( \sin \frac{\pi}{4} \right) = \ln (1 + \sqrt{2})$ . (3)

(b) Given that  $y = \operatorname{artanh} (\sin x)$ , show that  $\frac{dy}{dx} = \sec x$ . (2)

(c) Find the exact value of  $\int_0^{\frac{\pi}{4}} \sin x \operatorname{artanh} (\sin x) dx$ . (5)

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9. The parabola  $C$  has equation  $y^2 = 4ax$ , where  $a$  is a constant.

(a) Show that an equation for the normal to  $C$  at the point  $P(ap^2, 2ap)$  is

$$y + px = 2ap + ap^3. \quad (4)$$

The normals to  $C$  at the points  $P(ap^2, 2ap)$  and  $Q(aq^2, 2aq)$ ,  $p \neq q$ , meet at the point  $R$ .

(b) Find, in terms of  $a$ ,  $p$  and  $q$ , the coordinates of  $R$ . (5)

The points  $P$  and  $Q$  vary such that  $pq = 3$ .

(c) Find, in the form  $y^2 = f(x)$ , an equation of the locus of  $R$ . (4)
